

John Newton, although instructed in the Christian faith early in life by his dear mother, went to sea at age 11 and became an infidel with a blasphemous lifestyle. After years of sinful living, he entered the shameful slave-trade. God. in loving grace, allowed him to survive a severe fever in Africa, and later spared his ship from almost sinking in a storm. At reading some passages in Thomas à Kempis' Imitation of Christ, he began to reflect on his mother's early instruction. In true repentance, turning from his sins, he asked Christ into his heart and was powerfully converted. Later, he became a minister and wrote many famous hymns. Many, who do not know John Newton's story, do know his testimony of faith in the words of "Amazing Grace" (see page 4).

Though God loves us as are, He loves us too much to leave us that way. Just as Newton's life was raised up from the depths of sin by God's amazing grace, so we each need that same "resurrection." That is really what Easter is all about. The hope instilled in us through the fact of Christ's resurrection is not just for a future life in Heaven. Pastor's Postscript
