Pastor's Parcel

Recently Rosemary and I attended a Seventh-Day Adventist church at Weimar Institute where we were celebrating our 28th wedding anniversary. Adventists correctly observe Saturday as the seventh day, the day God rested from the work of creation. Why then do most churches celebrate Sunday?

Well, I don't think the little boy in the cartoon is correct in assuming Sunday is a day intended for rest. Pastors sure don't get much rest on Sundays. It really *isn't* the seventh but the *first* day of the week, the day our crucified Lord was raised from the grave. The early church began meeting on Sunday instead of Saturday to celebrate Christ's resurrection. A new age had begun. Sunday symbolizes the first day of a new creative work of God. It's a day to awaken to service in the Kingdom of God.

But Sunday, a day reminding us of new life in Christ, can also be understood as a *Sabbath*, "a day to rest from our own labors" and enjoy the fact that our salvation is God's work. We had nothing to do with paying the penalty of sin. That was Christ's work. We had no power to raise Jesus from death. That was the Father's work. We had no ability to



apply the work of the Cross to our own souls. That is the Holy Spirit's work in new birth. When we rest in God's work by faith, Sunday becomes a day to remember our own resurrection from death to life in Christ. We keep it "holy," obedience the Fourth in to Commandment, by meeting together as the Body of Christ, the Church, to foreshadow the final Sabbath rest in Heaven, which the Lord's death and resurrection has provided.

So, rest on Sunday. Make it a Sabbath! But remember, as the first day of the week, it symbolizes the awakening call of God to service in His Kingdom.

John Wesley's Conversion Experience

It happened on May 24, 1738. Its farreaching effects dramatically changed the face of a spiritually decadent England.

"I think," he wrote, "it was about five this morning, that I opened my Testament on those words, 'There are given unto us exceeding great and precious promises.'

Wesley writes that just as he went out, he opened the New Testament again on those words, "Thou art not far from the kingdom of God."

In the afternoon, he visited St. Paul's, and noted that the anthem was "Out of the deep have I called unto Thee O Lord."

Then, he describes the momentous visit to the Aldersgate meeting. "In the evening I went very unwillingly to a society in Aldersgate street, where one was reading Luther's preface to the Epistle to the Romans. About a quarter before nine, while he was describing the change which God works in the heart through faith in Christ, I felt my heart strangely warmed. I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone for salvation; and an assurance was given me that He had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death. I began to pray with all my might for those who had in a more especial manner despitefully used me and persecuted me. I then testified openly to all there what I now first felt in my heart."
