Psalm 116

Gratitude reveals our relationship with God; thanksgiving seals it.

**<u>INTRODUCTION</u>**: (Text as Scripture Reading)

-As we review <u>Psalm 116</u>, we are focusing on *thanksgiving*. But first, a question: "*How does it differ from gratitude?*" *Gratitude* as <u>an attitude</u>; *thanksgiving* <u>expresses it</u>. Usually we think of expressing it *verbally*. But <u>authentic *thanksgiving*</u> not only expresses the attitude of gratitude, but also demonstrates a relational connection.

-In <u>Psalm 116</u>, we'll see another way these terms differ: **HOM.idea**. So, *how does gratitude show our bond with God?* Let's look first at...

- **I.** Feeling Gratitude for Answered Prayer–<u>v.1-4</u>, I love the LORD, for he heard my voice; he heard my cry for mercy. Because he turned his ear to me, I will call on him as long as I live. The cords of death entangled me, the anguish of the grave came upon me; I was overcome by trouble and sorrow. Then I called on the name of the LORD: "O LORD, save me!"
  - A. <u>Prayer is a *natural reflex* in human beings</u>, existing in some degree in all religions. (Even <u>part-time religious believers</u> never have to *talk themselves* **into** *using prayer*. To <u>eliminate prayer from their</u> <u>thinking</u>, they have to *talk their minds* **out** of *it!*)
- B. Prayer asks 2 big theological questions:
  - 1. "*Is anybody there?*" [In some <u>movie comedies</u> you may have seen one character rapping on another's head, asking, "*Is anybody home?*"] (Prayer, for some people, is <u>an *experiment* to learn if God really *exists*.)</u>
- 2. But for those who are sure He does exist, prayer can ask *another* question: "*Does God care?*"
- C. When *entangled* with the "cords of death," caught in "the anguish of the grave," and "overcome by trouble and sorrow," this psalmist "called on the name of the LORD: O LORD, save me!" And what happened?
  - 1. First, he found that <u>God *did* care</u>! God *heard* his *voice*, *heard* his *"cry for mercy,"* and *"turned his ear to"* listen to his prayer.
  - 2. But then, when his prayer was answered, he made a decision: *"Because he turned his ear to me, I will call on him as long as I live."*

**TRANS**: God has answered more prayers in our lives than we can even

remember. That's because <u>new problems facing us</u> may distract us from the ones He just resolved. OR we may get so caught up enjoying the blessings received that we forget Who sent them. But, this psalmist was grateful, and his gratitude to God became an emotional expression: "I love the LORD" as well as a behavioral commitment: "I will call on him as long as I live." Gratitude reveals our relationship with God; thanksgiving seals it. Part of the expressed gratitude is displayed by...

- **II. Recounting His Goodness to Us**–<u>**v.5-11**</u>, *The LORD is gracious and righteous; our God is full of compassion. The LORD protects the simplehearted; when I was in great need, he saved me. Be at rest once more, O my soul, for the LORD has been good to you. For you, O LORD, have delivered my soul from death, my eyes from tears, my feet from stumbling, that I may walk before the LORD in the land of the living. I believed; therefore I said, "I am greatly afflicted." And in my dismay I said, "All men are liars."* 
  - A. Several <u>modern translations</u> offer a <u>better rendering</u> of those last two verses-<u>v.10-11</u> (NLT), I believed in you, so I said, "I am deeply troubled, LORD." In my anxiety I cried out to you, "These people are all liars!" (In this sense, <u>those verses continue to state *trust* in the midst of challenging circumstances. The focus is on: "I believed in you..."
    </u>
  - B. <u>What happens</u> when we *recount God's blessings*, His *gracious* and compassionate *protection*, the *deliverance* of our "*soul from death*," our "*eyes from tears*," our "*feet from stumbling*"? <u>2 wonderful things</u>:
  - Our journey takes on an inner peace: "Be at rest once more, O my soul, for the LORD has been good to you." (Inner turmoil is "the stuff dreams are made of" when they become nightmares! Jesus is our Healer not just of our spirit and body: <u>He heals the human soul</u>.)
  - 2. <u>Our journey comes under *new management*</u>, as we begin to "*walk before the LORD in the land of the living.*" (*What doe this mean?*)
  - a. To *walk before the LORD* means *living our lives* with a conscious sense of His presence, *wherever* we are, *whatever* we're doing.
  - b. To *walk before the LORD* means *letting His will direct our steps* by <u>submitting *our will* to the authority of His Word</u>.
  - c. To *walk before the LORD* means *adopting God's viewpoint* so that <u>our life "*in the land of the living*" becomes *Kingdom living*.</u>

**<u>TRANS</u>**: Counting our blessings and <u>recounting God's goodness</u> turn the *attitude of gratitude* into an *expression of thanksgiving*. When the

*grateful feelings* of our heart reach the *joyful proclamations* of our lips, we *confirm* our relationship with God before others. This is a way of...

- **III.** Sealing Our Dedication with Thanksgiving– <u>v.12-17</u>, How can I repay the LORD for all his goodness to me? I will lift up the cup of salvation and call on the name of the LORD. I will fulfill my vows to the LORD in the presence of all his people. Precious in the sight of the LORD is the death of his saints. O LORD, truly I am your servant; I am your servant, the son of your maidservant; you have freed me from my chains. I will sacrifice a thank offering to you and call on the name of the LORD.
  - A. If we could *serve God* for <u>as many millennia as there are stars in</u> <u>the universe</u>, **never** could we "*repay…all his goodness to*" us.
  - 1. <u>If His gifts could be *repaid*</u>, they'd not be *gifts* but *earnings*, fairtrade *exchanges*. (<u>If service could reimburse God for blessings</u>, we'd <u>owe Him not *thanksgiving* but <u>a tally of *work hours*</u>.)</u>
  - 2. C. S. Lewis said that <u>Christianity differs from other religions</u> because of "**grace**"– *God's unmerited and freely-given favor*.
  - B. But *grace* enables the Christian to say with the psalmist: "*O LORD*, *truly I am your servant;...you have freed me from my chains.*" (<u>As freed</u> *prisoners*, we serve Him with *loving gratitude* as we—\*
  - 1. \*"*lift up the cup of salvation and call on the name of the LORD.*" (At each prayerful celebration of the *Eucharist* [<u>lit</u>.: "*thanksgiving*"], we *lift up* Christ's *cup of salvation*, and "proclaim the Lord's death until he comes."
  - 2. \*fulfill our "vows to the LORD in the presence of all his people." (Why <u>v.15</u> ?- "Precious in the sight of the LORD is the **death** of his **saints**.")
  - a. <u>Jesus asks His Bride</u>, "Take up your cross and follow Me." (Our "*I will*" *pledges* a *death* to *self-life* and <u>our *marriage* to *His life*.)</u>
  - b. As <u>a Husband who openly pledged His troth to us on the Cross</u>, <u>He calls His Bride</u> to live out our vows <u>as publicly</u> as <u>He did</u>.

## **CONCLUSION:**

-The attitude of gratitude is <u>fulfilled by</u> open expression-<u>v.18-19</u>, I will fulfill my vows to the LORD in the presence of all his people, in the courts of the house of the LORD —in your midst, O Jerusalem. Praise the LORD. That public expression sets <u>a seal</u> on our relationship with God, letting all around us know <u>what Christ means us</u>. And people who know us should be <u>very familiar</u> with those last 3 words of this psalm being often on our lips. When they're in a conversation with us, they should never be surprised to hear us saying, "Praise the LORD."
