42-23-01-Last Word #1-Forgiveness Cross, forgiveness, understanding, prayer, Lent Luke 23:34

On the Cross, Jesus both purchased forgiveness and proclaimed it.

INTRODUCTION: (Gen 22:1-14 as the Scripture Reading)

-Those who think Jesus never preached from a wooden pulpit forget His sermon preached from Peter's boat... and they forget Calvary.

-The Cross was Christ's <u>final pulpit</u> where He <u>preached seven last</u>

<u>messages</u> in the <u>last 6 hours</u> of His earthly life. They are called "The Seven Words of the Cross." These will be <u>our focus this Lenten season</u>.

-The <u>1</u>st "last word" is forgiveness, from <u>Luke 23:34a</u>, Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." HOM.idea.

-His <u>1</u>st little <u>sermonette</u> from the Cross was actually a <u>prayer</u>, and...

I. This Prayer Revealed the Father's Mercy

- A. <u>It showed *Christ's confidence*</u> in the Father <u>during His suffering</u>:
- 1. <u>Quiet-times of solitude</u> are <u>condusive for prayer</u> (Jesus enjoyed them, too. BUT <u>this showed us we can pray anytime</u>, <u>anywhere</u>.)
- 2. When *tempted to question* His Father's will, <u>He *trusted*</u> Him. [Bad examples from *earthly fathers* have <u>led some to doubt</u> *God the Father*.]
- 3. <u>Christ's faith was stretched</u> to the <u>limit</u> on the Cross, but He'd <u>already committed Himself</u> in *Gethsemane* to "drink this cup"....
- B. <u>This prayer showed *His confidence*</u> that <u>forgiveness was part of</u> <u>the *Father's will*</u> (He <u>knew exactly what His suffering was for,</u> so He knew *not only* that His prayer *was <u>heard</u>*, but that it *would be <u>answered</u>.)*
- C. It showed *His confidence* in Scripture. [Jesus surely saw the parallels in the story of Abraham's test of faith, when Isaac, his 25 y/o son, let his 100 y/o father, with a knife in his hand, tie him up on a sacrificial wood pile!]
 - 1. <u>Abraham had heard</u>, "your only son...whom you love" <u>Jesus had heard</u>, "a voice from heaven said, 'This is my Son, whom I love..."
- 2. <u>Abraham had heard</u>, "Father?...but where is the lamb?" <u>Jesus had heard</u>, "Behold the Lamb of God who take away the sin of the world."
- 3. <u>Isaac carried the wood</u> for the offering <u>Jesus carried His cross</u>.
- 4. After a 3-day journey, Abraham told his servants, "We will worship and... come back to you" Jesus told us He would rise in 3 days Luke 9:22, And he said, "The Son of Man must suffer many things and be rejected by the elders, chief priests and teachers of the law, and he must be killed and on the third day be raised to life."

TRANS: Jesus knew He was the <u>sacrifice</u> that the angel told Abraham <u>God would provide</u>. He knew why He was fastened to a wooden cross, why the knife that Isaac missed would soon pierce His side, and why, as He told the Jews in <u>John 8:56</u>, "Your father Abraham rejoiced to see My day, and he saw it and was glad." Yes, Abraham was glad for Isaac to stay alive! But another Son, the Father's own, would die and rise 3 days later. Jesus knew His Father's merciful plan to bring forgiveness to lost humanity, so He prayed with confidence, "Father, forgive them..." On the Cross, Jesus both purchased forgiveness and proclaimed it.

II. This Prayer Revealed the Son's Ministry

- A. <u>Jesus prayed it as He hung between earth & heaven</u> (<u>symbolizing</u> His ministry as <u>Heaven</u>'s <u>Intercessor</u> for earthly <u>humanity</u>)—
 - 1. We need an Intercessor [In StarTrek's "Insurrection" episode, Picard chides a rebel, Golna, for his plan to destroy his own people, he responds, "Is that the way a Federation officer pleads for his life?" Picard replies, "I'm not pleading for my life; I'm pleading for yours. You can still go home, Golna."] (On the Cross, Jesus was pleading: You can still go Home!)
- 2. Our *need for an Intercessor* draws us to the Cross– <u>John 12:32</u>, "But I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all men to myself."
- B. By the *Incarnation*, <u>God exemplified *intercessory prayer*</u> (putting into *practice* <u>as a human</u> what He *preaches* <u>as God!</u>)
- C. The <u>Cross began a new phase of Christ's intercessory ministry</u>:
 - 1. He now <u>intercedes in Heaven</u>— <u>Heb 7:25-26a</u>, Therefore he is able to save completely those who come to God through him, because he always lives to <u>intercede</u> for them. Such a high priest meets our need...
 - 2. Jesus still <u>intercedes on Earth</u> through <u>us</u>, the <u>Church</u>, <u>His Body</u>:
 - a. We are earthly temples where He continues carrying His Cross.
 - b. Our response to the Cross is to be *like His*: interceding for our persecutors— Mat 5:44-45a, ...Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, that you may be sons of your Father in heaven.

<u>TRANS</u>: Human nature tends to hold on to hurts, until they <u>turn into</u> painful bitterness. Divine nature <u>calls</u> us to forgive, and Jesus showed <u>us how to do it</u> while the hurting was still happening! He also added a <u>phrase</u> to this prayer that is <u>both powerful</u> and <u>perplexing</u>: "for they do not know what they are doing." This is <u>so significant</u>, because <u>it shows that</u>...

- A. *Ignorance* is <u>dangerous</u>, even <u>lethal</u>— <u>Prov 10:21</u> (NKJV), The lips of the righteous feed many, But fools die for lack of wisdom.
- B. The *lost* at the foot of the Cross lacked the knowledge of salvation:
 - 1. <u>The *soldiers*</u> were *utilitarians*, *pragmatists* [<u>The Romans</u> were experts in *know-how*.]: "What matters is getting the job done."
- 2. The *crowds* were *hedonists*, *relativists* ["Hosanna!" today, "Crucify!" tomorrow]: "If it feels right, do it! Truth changes with the times."
- 3. The *priests* were power brokers, the elite: "It's right, if it fits our agenda, our values. Don't bother us with the facts."
- C. Christ's prayer created an environment of hope for lost humanity (the pragmatists, the hedonists, the power brokers of every age):
 - 1. He knew their perspectives had been distorted by selfishness....
 - 2. Only a <u>demonstration of undeserved love</u> could reach the lost [<u>The centurion</u>, who expected cursing, <u>heard instead a prayer forgiving him</u>, and it <u>changed his heart</u>— <u>Mark 15:39</u>, And when the centurion, who stood there in front of Jesus, heard his cry and saw how he died, he said, "Surely this man was the Son of God!"]

CONCLUSION:

-[European singer, Henriette Sontag, was slandered by a rival, who even disrupted her concerts. Years later, when this rival went blind, the singer befriended her and saw to her needs. When people asked why such kindness to one who had been so cruel, she said, "She didn't realize what she was doing."] It's not easy to forgive. Forgiveness wasn't easy for Jesus to purchase. But He showed us how to do it by practicing what He preached, [Poem by an unknown author:

"Father, forgive them," Jesus prayed, "They do they know not what," he said; With heart compassionate he pled For foes intent his blood to shed.

His back with stinging scourge was torn, His head was pierced with crown of thorn, A cross his foes prepared for him, And yet he pled with God for them! O heart of Christ! O truth divine, Was ever love so great as thine? Though doomed to crucifixion's throes; Thou didst forgive thy bitter foes.

O Christ, our Advocate in heaven, Pray thou our sins may be forgiven; Impart to us thy gentleness, And give us grace our foes to bless.]

-God help us to follow our Lord in being always ready to pray that prayer, and to pray it truly, whenever we are hurt by others: "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing."
