#### Acts 3:11-16 (NIV)

<sup>11</sup>While the beggar held on to Peter and John, all the people were astonished and came running to them in the place called Solomon's Colonnade. <sup>12</sup>When Peter saw this, he said to them: "Men of Israel, why does this surprise you? Why do you stare at us as if by our own power or godliness we had made this man walk? <sup>13</sup>The God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, the God of our fathers, has glorified his servant Jesus. You handed him over to be killed, and you disowned him before Pilate, though he had decided to let him go. <sup>14</sup>You disowned the Holy and Righteous One and asked that a murderer be released to you. <sup>15</sup>You killed the author of life, but God raised him from the dead. We are witnesses of this. <sup>16</sup>By faith in the name of Jesus, this man whom you see and know was made strong. It is Jesus' name and the faith that comes through him that has given this complete healing to him, as you can all see. 44-03-0-Our Trust in Christ's Victory

Apostles Creed, faith, Gospel, crucifixion, resurrection, testimony Acts 3:11-16

The sufferings of Christ brought our victory in Christ.

#### **INTRODUCTION:**

-Our Scripture reading today told of a lame man healed in Jesus' name, and <u>Peter used that occasion to tell the Gospel</u> to the crowd who witnessed the healing. We get the same <u>opportunity to explain our faith</u>, whenever God's hand is seen in *answered prayer*, in nature's *beauty*, or in *God-incidences* (not *coincidences*), but when God does *miracles*. If we say, "*I believe God is behind that*," we can go on to tell <u>what we</u> <u>believe about God and His plan for us</u>. This is why it's crucial to know what we are confessing in the Apostle's Creed. Today we will explore: "*I believe* . . . (Jesus) *suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, dead, and buried; He descended into hell; the third day he rose again from the dead.*" This phrase describes **Our Trust in Christ's Victory**. It's the heart of the Gospel, the "Good News" that **HOM.idea**.

#### I. Jesus Suffered under Pontius Pilate

- A. <u>His name is in the Creed</u> not just as a historical record, but because everyone knew that <u>Pilate was against putting Jesus to death</u>.
- 1. <u>His wife warned</u>, "Don't have anything to do with that **innocent** man, for I have suffered a great deal today in a dream because of him." (<u>Mat 27:19</u>b)
- 2. <u>He knew Christ was innocent</u>– <u>Luke 23:21b-22a</u>, "What crime has this man committed? I have found in him no grounds for the death penalty."
- 3. <u>He made his opinion public</u>–<u>Mat 27:24</u>, When Pilate saw that he was getting nowhere,... he took water and washed his hands in front of the crowd. "I am innocent of this man's blood," he said. "It is your responsibility!"
- B. *So, why is <u>his name</u> in the Creed?* <u>It shows</u> that Jesus <u>suffers under</u> individuals–<u>Acts 9:4-5</u>, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?...I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting." (He *suffers under* sinners till they become saints... Pilate's name could be replaced by Saul's or by ours.)

**TRANS:** Jesus suffered injustice *willingly*-<u>**1** Pet 3:18a</u> (NKJV), For Christ also suffered once for sins, the just for the unjust, that He might bring us to God." Only the sacrifice of the innocent Lamb of God could "take away the sin of the world." The sufferings of Christ brought our victory in Christ.

# II. Jesus Was Crucified, Dead, and Buried

- A. <u>These 3 words denied</u> *Gnostic ideas* about Jesus. [<u>Gnostics taught</u> that Jesus only appeared to be human, that He did not really die on the Cross, and that what appeared to be His body dissipated into thin air in the tomb.]
- B. But "*crucified, dead, and buried*" parallel 3 other words from the *original curse* upon Adam's race: *tree, death,* and *earth*.
- 1. <u>Sin's curse</u> came from *a tree*, and <u>sin's curse</u> was defeated *on a tree*–<u>Gal 3:13</u>, Christ redeemed us from the curse of the law by becoming a curse for us, for it is written: "Cursed is everyone who is hung on a tree."
- Sin brought us *death*, but by Christ's *death* our life of sin is put to death-<u>1 Pet 2:24</u>, He himself bore our sins in his body on the tree, so that we might die to sins and live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been healed. (<u>His *death*</u> became our victory over sin and death.)
- 3. Sin turns us back to *earthly dust*; Christ's *burial* in an *earthly tomb*, planted *the seed for the renewal* of <u>us</u> and <u>all creation</u>!

**TRANS:** "...*crucified, dead, buried*"...*a tree, death, the earth*: Perfect parallels. But for <u>His identification with humanity</u> to be *complete*, Jesus went to <u>where death took humanity</u>– <u>1 Pet 3:18-19</u> (NKJV), For Christ also suffered once for sins, the just for the unjust, that He might bring us to God, being put to death in the flesh but made alive by the Spirit, by whom also He went and preached to the spirits in prison. <u>The Creed records this part of the story</u>....

- III. Jesus Descended into Hell [Hades, "the abode of the dead"]
  - A. Something very important happened when Jesus descended into Hades– [Jesus told the Apostle John] in <u>**Rev. 1:18**</u>, "I am the Living One; I was dead, and behold I am alive for ever and ever! And I hold the keys of death and Hades." (Satan once held "the power of death"—now Jesus does.)
- B. Also, during death, He did what He'd done in life: He "preached."
- "Does that mean people can repent after death?" (We're not told directly, but we have indirect clues in <u>1 Pet 4:6</u>, For this is the reason the gospel was preached even to those who are now dead, so that they might be judged according to men in regard to the body, but live according to God in regard to the spirit. (What that *fully* means, <u>I don't know</u>...)
- But I do know what <u>Rom 1:16</u> says "the gospel... is the power of God for the salvation of everyone who believes. <u>Can the dead repent and</u> <u>become part of</u> "everyone who believes" ? *I don't profess to know*.)

TRANS: But I do confess: "Jesus descended into Hell." He underwent

the whole human experience, from *birth* to *death* to *an out-of-body afterlife*. <u>Perhaps</u> He *did* tell those "spirits in prison," "Your sins are paid *for... you will get your bodies back.*" <u>It's unknown</u>, *but we do know...* 

# IV. The Third Day Jesus Rose Again from the Dead

A. Christ's Incarnation wasn't just <u>a temporary sojourn with us</u>.

- 1. God intended *through His Son* to share our human journey for all eternity, and He sealed that intention by *a bodily resurrection*.
- 2. <u>The Incarnation</u> is the most <u>human-friendly concept</u> there can be, and <u>the Resurrection</u> made <u>human-friendly</u> realities permanent.)
- B. The *Resurrection* didn't just bring <u>victory over death</u> but <u>validated</u> <u>everything Jesus had taught</u> *about Himself* and *about God's will*. (If He wasn't raised from death, <u>His word was *falsehood*</u>; but if on "the third day he rose again from the dead," as the Creed declares, then <u>His word is truth</u> and <u>He is humanity's only Savior</u>).
- C. The Resurrection clearly identified Jesus with the 1st Adam.
  - 1. Adam *came to life from the earth*, and Jesus—called by Scripture the 2<sup>nd</sup> Adam—*came to life from an earthly grave*.
  - 2. Jesus, the *new Adam*, is the *God-Man Savior* of the old race of Adam and *God-Man King* of a whole new race of humanity.

## **<u>CONCLUSION</u>**:

-Jesus suffered *injustice*, a *cruel death*, and a *3-day trip to the gloom of Hades*. That God *in our human condition* experienced those sufferings is, in itself, a victory for humanity. But an even greater victory is that this God-Man is alive in that same human flesh now and for eternity.

### Easter Truths (DLH, 3/20/2018)

The Son of God became the Son of man To bury sinful Adam's ancient sway, To orchestrate redemption's master plan, To birth a human race that could obey. As one of us, He came from Mary's womb. As King of kings, He left an empty tomb. As Life Eternal, He's the only Way.

In Him, our hope is forever secure. This is our faith. This is our Creed.
