How we respond to divine epiphanies is a choice of the will.

## **INTRODUCTION:**

-HOM.idea. 3 versions of <u>Titus 2:11</u> (NIV), For the grace of God that brings salvation has appeared to all men. – (YLT), For the saving grace of God was manifested to all men, – (MSG), God's readiness to give and forgive is now public. Salvation's available for everyone! <u>But</u>, the openly manifested or "public" epiphany of "saving grace" can be rejected instead of embraced. –[<u>David Ulin</u> in The Atlantic, 12/30/2020: "I don't believe epiphanies exist... We're born, we die, and no one ever changes really. Even for James Joyce, an epiphany is just a literary device (a writing trick)."] Some <u>early</u> writers for The Atlantic would disagree, and I'll <u>quote them</u> to illustrate <u>why epiphanies of God's grace</u> are real and must be embraced. First,

# I. Divine enlightenment is univeral.

- A. [<u>Ralph Waldo Emerson</u>] wrote: "The intuition of the moral sentiment is an insight of the perfection of the laws of the soul... not subject to circumstance."]
- B. Scripture agrees: *moral enlightenment* is built into humans— John 1:9, The true light that gives light to every man was coming into the world. (This verse says *Jesus morally enlightens every person.*)

<u>TRANS</u>: *Upbringing*, *education* or *experience* can dominate ideas of *right* or *wrong*, until a *divine epiphany* offers *new insight*. [Oliver Wendell Holmes, Sr. said, "A moment's insight is sometimes worth a life's experience."] But merely receiving the *insight* is not enough....

## II. Divine enlightenment must get through to the heart.

- A. [H. W. Longfellow, after losing his wife in a fire and learning that his son was seriously wounded in the Civil War, wrote "I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day." His poem expresses doubts about "peace on earth," until an epiphany described in the last verse: "Then pealed the bells more loud and deep: / 'God is not dead, nor doth He sleep; / The Wrong shall fail, / The Right prevail, / With peace on earth, good-will to men.""]
- B. <u>Like those bells</u>, <u>Luke 1:78b-79a</u> rings out a "public" epiphany–(NKJ) "...the Dayspring from on high has visited us; To give light to those who sit in darkness and the shadow of death, To guide our feet into the way of peace."

<u>TRANS</u>: Once God *enlightens our hearts*, the ball is in our court. **How** we respond to divine epiphanies is a choice of the will. *That means...* 

#### III. Divine enlightenment must be personally embraced.

- A. [James R. Lowell] wrote: "Once to ev'ry man and nation / Comes the moment to decide, / In the strife of truth and falsehood, / For the good or evil side."] (While the lost must embrace "saving grace" for salvation, we as believers must embrace it for becoming more like Jesus.)
- B. *Epiphanies* help Christians grow in grace, *if we <u>embrace</u> them*. [<u>J. C. Ryle</u> wrote: "When I speak of growth in grace, I mean an increase in the degree, size, strength, vigor, and power of the graces that the Spirit plants in our hearts. When I speak of a person growing in grace, I mean simply this—that his sense of sin is becoming deeper, his faith stronger, his hope brighter, his love more extensive, and his spiritual-mindedness more marked."]

#### **CONCLUSION:**

-<u>Peter concluded his  $2^{nd}$  epistle</u> with <u>an good exhortation</u> for us to heed as we meet with *epiphanies* and *divine enlightenments* in this new year. It also calls us to praise Jesus every day, all year long- <u>2 Peter 3:18</u>, But grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. To him be glory both now and forever! Amen. And here's <u>a good motto for doing both</u>: *Embrace and exalt God's Son in 2021!*
